The free training helps unskilled and unemployed individuals obtain New York State licensing to become Personal Care Aides and Home Health Aides. To provide homes that workers can afford in Westchester County, where the median cost of a home is among the nation's most expensive, allows teachers, police, fire fighters, seniors, people with disabilities and other productive members of our community to live within a reasonable commute to their jobs. It is a way for young families to stay in the area and invigorate our community. Affordable housing helps keep the local economy humming.

United Way's Homeward Bound partners work to create a more **favorable climate** in local communities for the development and preservation of affordable housing. Homeward Bound provides information, technical assistance and education to local officials, residents and other stakeholders to assist in developing affordable housing plans and projects that will get widespread community support.

Affordable housing also helps people with disabilities in our community live productive, independent lives. Homeward Bound partners recruit volunteers and work with advocacy groups to make sure that the people with disabilities also have a place to call home within our communities.
